

- I. Jesus publicly called a man to follow Him who was seen as a <u>betrayer</u> of the Jewish people.
 - A. This account in Matthew had to be <u>personal</u>.
 - B. Tax collecting was one of the least <u>liked</u> and least <u>respected</u> professions.
 - C. "Sinners" were considered unclean.

- II. Jesus faced immediate, intense public criticism.
 - A. Jesus agreed that sinners were sick / lost.
 - B. Jesus did disagree when it comes to their <u>value</u>. Consider Luke 15
 - C. Throwing a rope to the person who knows they are <u>drowning</u> makes complete sense.

- III. Jesus publicly <u>answered</u> their criticism of hanging out with sinners in three ways.
 - A. This man (like all sinners) is <u>sick</u>.
 - B. Learn what it means in Hosea 6:6 when God says, "I desire <u>mercy</u>, and not <u>sacrifice</u>."
 - C. "I came <u>NOT</u> to call the righteous, but sinners."

- 3 important lessons Jesus is teaching.
- 1. Jesus came to save <u>sinners</u>.
- 2. Jesus will not be deterred.
- 3. When one sinner comes home to Jesus a <u>party</u> breaks out in heaven. "On earth as it is in heaven..." is our <u>invitation</u> to join the party.
