#### I. The Perspective

- A.Isaiah has a vision of God's throne room. When he sees how holy God is, Isaiah says, "Woe is me!"
- B.This is a <u>right</u> perspective of our relationship to God.
- C.But "woes" are not without <u>hope</u>.
- D.God always gives a chance for repentance and redemption.

#### II. The Preparation

- A. Isaiah's cleansing by the seraphim points to the redemptive work that <u>Jesus</u> does for us today.
- B. The sacrifice <u>atoned</u> for Isaiah's sins.

#### III. The Sending

- A.When God asks, "Whom shall I send?" Isaiah responds in <u>quick obedience</u>.
- B.Isaiah has gone from "<u>woe</u> is me" to "<u>send</u> me."
- C.The dual reality: we are simultaneously <u>unworthy</u> and yet fully <u>redeemed</u>.

### IV. The Challenge

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
