I. The Perspective

A. Isaiah has a vision of God's throne room. When he sees how holy God is, Isaiah says, "Woe is me!"

B. This is a right perspective of our relationship to God.

C. But "woes" are not without hope.

D. God always gives a chance for repentance and redemption.

II. The Preparation

A. Isaiah's cleansing by the seraphim points to the redemptive work that Jesus does for us today.

B. The sacrifice atoned for Isaiah's sins.

III. The Sending

A. When God asks, “Whom shall I send?”

Isaiah responds in quick obedience .

B. Isaiah has gone from “woe is me” to
“send me.”

C. The dual reality: we are simultaneously
unworthy and yet fully redeemed .
